Workshop on how to strengthen the quality of education

10.00-10.30 Welcome and introductions

10.30-12.30 Session 1: What do we know about creating quality in learning and teaching today? What types of pedagogical approaches are effective in supporting and facilitating the student's learning process? How important are the role of the teacher and also the role of institutional management?

Speakers:

Simon Barrie, Center for Teaching and Learning, Sydney University

The presentation introduces some key insights from research on student learning, and higher education curriculum renewal to set the scene for the workshop. It poses three questions: What might the student learning research offer to a consideration of quality? What sort of knowledge is needed for tomorrow's society? What institutional strategies build engagement in quality education?

Sari Lindblom-Ylänne, University of Helsinki

Assessing student learning: Focus on the grassroot level, i.e., on assessment practices, constructive alignment and challenges related to fairness, reliability and validity of assessment.

Halvor Fauske, Højskolen i Lillehammer (CANCELLED)

Focus on education within the applied science and professional education sector. The presentation will address the applied dimension in education and teaching, and how to develop student's action competences.

Which methods are most effective in the systematic implementation of knowledge and best practice among teachers? And what kind of strategic decisions are needed by institutional management to support the necessary educational changes?
